








UVCE CHRONICLES - LATEST EPSODE

Our guest for this episode is one of the most influential personas of Karnataka - **N Manjunath Prasad** (Batch of 1987). An accomplished civil servant, he is the longest serving Commissioner of BBMP and the Managing Director of KSRTC, and is currently the Chief Minister's Principal Secretary.

Mr. Prasad also shares his advice for IAS aspirants, and how his experience as a faculty member has shaped his perspective as a civil servant.

The lab was busy from the past few weeks, filled with enthusiastic learners and teachers as the coordinators' selection process was approaching its end. The coordinators had been doing their best to select the right people for the job, considering their skills and interests.

Then came the round of interviews which was held online on the second Sunday of the month. We had our panellists Anish Krishnakumar, Anupama G Hegde and Adrian P Isaac thoroughly questioning newly-to-be coordinators. After a whole lot of questioning and understanding, Marvel has its new coordinators, Prajwal A from 3rd Year Mech, Bhavid A from 3rd Year ECE, Aryan Aithal from 2nd Year AIML, Sujay Vikram G S from 2nd Year ECE, Mohammed Hamza from 2nd Year ECE, G R Sharveshram from 2nd Year AIML. Marvel also chose two consultants Shreyas Das from 2nd Year CSE and Harsha Chigurupati from 2nd Year AIML to keep track of the project track and competition track respectively.

The following week were centred around batch three students, as their deadline for completing common tasks was fast approaching. The third batch of students had worked hard all month to finish their common task. The tasks were challenging and students had put in a lot of effort to complete them on time. The coordinators provided guidance and support throughout the month and offered assistance wherever needed. As the deadline drew near, the students worked extra hard to make sure that their work would be up to the high standards expected of them. The coordinators monitored their progress and provided feedback on their work to help them reach their goals. At the end of the third week, students managed to complete their tasks on time. INSIDE THE MIND OF THE PODCASTERS

We are excited to give our readers a glimpse into a discussion between the members of the UVCE Chronicles **Team who have been dedicatedly working to give us a gem of podcasts about namma UVCEians**. There is a Chronicle episode with the entire team sharing their experiences along with bloopers. You can check it out here - **Chronicles Link** The participants of this discussion are

Adrian: So let's begin. Fouzan, when did you join Chronicles?

Fouzan: I joined in the middle of 2022. I was an ambitious second year in UVCE, trying to do as much as I can in the n number of initiatives our college has going on. Initially Chronicles was not something I was comfortable doing but something I have always wanted to do if that makes sense. I've wanted to be a journalist since 6th grade. So 6th grade me was thriving doing Chronicles work aka conducting interviews. What was your experience like, Adrian?

Adrian: The first time I heard about Chronicles was the very first episode. I remember messaging Varsha and telling her that this is an absolutely fantastic initiative. She asked me if I was interested in hosting an episode and I was immediately onboarded when we had only one episode in the pipeline. It's just been a very humbling experience to see how Chronicles started off with a very bootstrapped approach and now it's gone on to 30+ episodes.

Fouzan: Chronicles is a construct of UVCE and now, for me at least, it's inseparable from UVCE.

Adrian: One thing our readers may not know is that the podcast started in the middle of the pandemic. So most of season one was recorded online. Anupama, you've been associated with Chronicles since season two, so what does Chronicles mean to you?

Anupama: Chronicles is really close to my heart. When Varsha messaged me, I was on the bus going to my hometown and that's how I got into Chronicles. I was scared initially, but once a podcast recording is done, the feeling that you have cannot be expressed.

Adrian: What's your favourite episode so far?

Anupama: It's Srikanth sir [S1: EP 5.1,5.2], I don't know why, but I have listened to it about five times.

Fouzan: Do you find yourself listening to whatever you've recorded? For me, I couldn't go through it initially and now I find myself playing only my part. Do you listen to your episodes, Anupama and Adrian?

Anupama: Yeah, I do but I skip my parts.

Adrian: It just feels terrible to hear your own voice initially, but now, after sitting in on a lot of editing sessions I've got comfortable listening to my own voice. Abhishek, when did you join the Chronicles team? And how has the editing experience been so far?

Abhishek: I mentioned in casual conversation that I had some experience editing audio for school and then Fouzan reached out to me and I said yes. My first episode was with Manjunath Hebbar [S2:EP7]. Right now we have two mics, but back then we didn't have them. Editing was difficult before and now it's become a lot easier. What I do is, I listen to the entire recording and pick out some parts which can be added at the start so that there is something to look forward to in the episode.



Fouzan: Yes, I think this should be the template for Chronicles moving forward. A perfect template in terms of the edit would be Naveen Kumar [S2:EP8]. Another thing is Chronicles is a very high effort and passionate project, and ensuring that every episode gets the coverage and reach that it deserves is a job every team member takes seriously.

Adrian: True. I think from end to end it at least takes us on average a good month or so to come up with an idea, contact the guests, record the episode, edit it, publish it and then do the marketing. So Anupama for those of our readers who haven't actually listened to Chronicles, What do you want to tell them?

Anupama: Chronicles is not just a podcast which we do. It has so much information and life values from the alumni who have experienced it all. You can listen to this podcast at 'UVCE Chronicles' on Spotify.

Adrian: Well, now Chronicles has new members in the team - Nitin, Sujay, Prajwal and Deepak (mention each of their branches and years) who will be working on the editing aspect. So you can expect to listen to a Chronicles episode every fortnight, each with a unique editing signature.

Fouzan: Adrian, which one is your favourite episode?

Adrian: Arvind Bhat's episodes [S1: EP 10.1, 10.2] holds a very significant place in my heart since it was my first episode. It was a two-parter, the conversation was very insightful. When I casually asked him about how he deals with the highs and lows in life, especially when you're a sports person and your schedule is not well defined, he opened up about a near-death experience he had and how he overcame it.

Adrian: Abhishek, any episode that is special to you?

Abhishek: Manomurthy Sir's episode, which is not released yet. Because I'm an editor, the value that's in the conversation that happens matters but for me the production value matters too. So in that episode everything was perfect since we recorded it in Mano sir's studio.

Adrian: How are the alumni as guests?

Anupama: First, we take them through the entire process. I will give you an example - Ravi Kumar Sir [S2:EP2], a 1973 batch alumni. I was scared about what he thinks of me but they know it is difficult for both the parties involved in the recording. They are nervous about the process but rude? - NEVER.

Fouzan: I feel our Alumni have not lost touch with what's going on around them, and it's consistent with almost every alumni we've met. They're highly self aware which explains the nervousness. Them being nervous is kind of wholesome because it shows that they care about this. Even if they are significantly older, technology is something that they want to and are actively trying to understand. You can see that they are trying to understand what a podcast is and what is going to happen when we put it on Spotify. People outside UVCE, if you are reading, this may not be relatable for you. It's a very exclusive characteristic trait of UVCE alumni and you won't be able to find this experience anywhere else.

Adrian: Anupama, I think a lot of our readers, especially alumni Would be curious to know, do you have to be very famous to be on Chronicles? Is that a necessity?

Anupama: Absolutely not. It's not that UVCE does not have popular alumni. There are several popular Alumni that we approach. To contrast, let's take Ramesh Aravind Sir [S3:EP1] who is very famous but also Suraj Prasad Sir [S2:EP5] who we came to know because of Chronicles.



Adrian: Now not just alumni, shortly the readers will be able to listen to a podcast by the BOG of UVCE, Muthuraman sir. He didn't study in UVCE, but he is associated with UVCE.

Fouzan: We did not start out that way, it's changed now. It's anyone who is associated with UVCE, so Nikhil Kamath sir, if you are reading this I would love to personally have you on Chronicles!

Adrian: Our readers are familiar with Sampada interviews over its 150+ editions. Chronicles follows a very similar format of interviewing alumni. It is just an extension to Sampada interviews and the interviews will always continue to be a hallmark of Sampada. Abhishek any concluding words for the readers?

Abhishek: I just want to add to what Anupama said. Alumni are very humble and kind. So when we went to record Manomurthy Sir's episode, we all know him as a famous musician but in the introduction we mentioned that he had a stellar academic track record which includes 2 degrees in the US. He just casually laughs it off completely disregarding that. Their humbleness cannot be overstated.



CIRCUITSAVYY TEAM - BNMIT IOT HACKATHON WIN

CircuitSavyy is the name of our squad and we had a wonderful experience taking part at BNMIT in their 12-hour IoT Hackathon. Our group had four members: Manoj shetty, Kavita Shankar, Yashwant SV, and Yeshwant S. We developed a solution for wireless EV charging which was based on IoT. This system implemented intelligent charging algorithms to optimize the charging process. These algorithms considered factors such as battery capacity, charging speed, and energy availability to provide an efficient and safe charging experience. The charging pad was integrated with an IoT platform to enable advanced functionalities. It allowed users to monitor and control the charging process remotely through a mobile application or a web interface. It included authentication mechanisms, encryption protocols, and fault detection mechanisms.

And the electricity needed for that project was produced by turning wind turbines and produced wind energy into electricity. Breakfast and lunch were delectable, and snacks and a coffee or tea break helped us feel refreshed. It was a positive experience overall. We won first place, too. This is a result of teamwork. We would also like to thank MARVEL UVCE for funding us to participate in this event, will be looking forward for the same.

BU orders UVCE students to vacate Jnana Bharathi campus hostels by May 1

Despite the extension of the status quo to maintain academic and administrative arrangements between the University of Visvesvaraya College of Engineering (UVCE) and Bangalore University for the next one year, conflict continues. In a fresh development, Bangalore University issued a unilateral order and asked the students of the UVCE residing in three hostels on its Jnana Bharathi campus to vacate by May 1.

The Director of the Directorate of Student's Welfare of Bangalore University sent a notice to the hostels on April 27 stating, "The UVCE has become a completely independent university from the academic year 2023-24. No fund has been sanctioned by the government to the engineering students. Therefore, all the engineering students should vacate the hostels by May 1."

The UVCE was to be the first autonomous State university along the lines of the Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs), but plans were derailed following a paucity of funds. However, after outrage from students and staff, the Higher Education Department extended the status quo of financial and administrative powers of the UVCE with Bangalore University till March 31, 2024.

While the State government made the UVCE, affiliated to Bangalore University since 1964, autonomous in March 2022, civil and other engineering branches continued on the Jnana Bharathi campus and the university has provided hostel facility for engineering students on the same campus. There are around 150 engineering students staying in the three hostels. The latest order has put such students in trouble.

A student of the UVCE, said, "I have come from Raichur and have been staying in this hostel for two years. Now, all of a sudden, we are asked to move out of the hostel by May 1. My parents are worried. We brought this issue to our principal's notice. But there has been no proper response. Therefore, the Board of Governors (BoG) of the UVCE should immediately resolve this problem. Otherwise, all the hostel students will go on an indefinite fast from Monday."

A delegation of the All-India Democratic Students' Organisation and the UVCE Students' Struggle Committee met Bangalore University Vice-Chancellor on Friday and requested him to take a stand in favour of the students.

Jayakara S.M., Vice-Chancellor of Bangalore University said, "The UVCE has become an independent university from the academic year 2023-24. However, the government has extended the status quo of the UVCE for one more academic year. According to this status quo order, the UVCE should reimburse the fund for us. But, there is no sign from the UVCE in this regard. The BoG of the UVCE has never discussed anything about financial assistance. We can't bare the hostel expenditure of engineering students. Therefore, we decided to get the hostels vacated."

UVCE hostel issue: Revised circular states students need not vacate hostel, yet confusion prevails

Students from the University of Visveswaraya College of Engineering (UVCE) are distressed after they have been asked to vacate their hostels by May 1.

On March 25, 2022, UVCE was granted autonomous status. However, due to financial constraints, the state government issued an order to maintain status quo for a year, wherein, the college continue to act as a constituent college of Bangalore University. One year up, over 350 UVCE students, who are residing in BU hostels, have been asked to vacate, stated a report in The New Indian Express.

"There is a lot of confusion as to what is exactly happening. When we approach UVCE authorities, they say that they are not authorised to talk about the issue and direct us to a different official. While UVCE is saying that it will be handled, BU is maintaining that we have to vacate by Monday," a student told TNIE.

The students met Bangalore University Vice Chancellor, on Friday, April 28, describing they are left without any accommodation from the next week.

Relief for students

Speaking to TNIE, UVCE Chairman B Muthuraman claimed that the issue has been rectified. "The students will not have to vacate. A circular has been issued in this regard, as there was a mistake initially," he said.

The circular, issued on Friday, stated that "all the students can continue to stay in the hostel with all the existing facilities/status."

However, BU Registrar Mahesh Babu said that no efforts have been made to start a discussion on the UVCE issue "The students are the responsibility of UVCE. Alternative arrangements will need to be made for them, however, they have not approached us at all. We have no budgetary allocations to feed or house the students for longer, so some arrangement will need to be made for the students from the UVCE side," he said.

Bangalore University relieves 77 faculty members and 29 technical staff of UVCE from service

Despite the State government extending the status quo of the University Visvesvaraya College of Engineering (UVCEs) academic and administrative arrangement with the Bangalore University (BU), the latter has relieved 77 faculty members and 29 technical staff of UVCE from service.

"UVCE teaching and non-teaching staff have decided to continue their service in the same institution after the government rejected their proposal to opt into Bangalore University. Therefore, Bangalore University has relieved them from service," sources said.

UVCE was a constituent college of Bangalore University since 1964 and it became an autonomous institution on March 25, 2022. Due to financial crunch and other issues, a total of 69 teaching faculty and few technical staff decided to opt into Bangalore University. They also submitted a representation to the government along with the staff list and documents for further action on March 9, 2023.

The staff preferred to opt into BU for their terminal benefits like pension, gratuity, leave encashment, commutation, and National Pension Scheme (NPS) contribution. However, there is was government engineering college in Bangalore University limits to depute them, due to which the government rejected their proposal.

"The government had said they can be transferred and accommodated to other government engineering colleges," a source said.

The government released Rs.35 crore fund to UVCE and extended the status quo of academic and administrative arrangement with the Bangalore University for the next one year in April, after which the teaching and non-teaching staff decided to stay back with UVCE and requested to be relieved from the service.

Jayakara S.M., Vice-Chancellor of Bangalore University, said: "UVCE was a constituent college of Bangalore University and has been working as an autonomous university since March 2022. The government has decided to develop it in the Indian Institute of Technology model and provided an adequate fund for the institution. Therefore, all permanent teaching and non-teaching staff wanted opt to into the same institution and requested to be relieved from our university. After they exit from here, then only will they be eligible to enrol in the Human Resource Management System, and get the salary from the government. So, we relieved them from the service of Bangalore University."
