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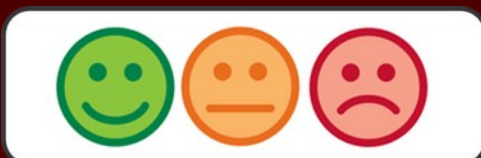

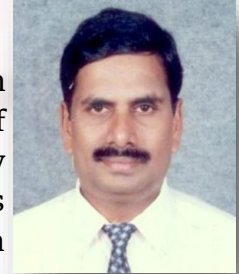

## FACULTY SPEAK

On the occasion of preparation starting for the Centenary Celebrations, to sought a few thoughts from the faculty of UVCE on the same, TEAM SAMPADA interviewed DR. B M Rajaprakash Sir, Head of the Mechanical Engineering Department of UVCE. Here's the snippet from an interview with him:

**Team Samapada:** *How would you describe your relationship with UVCE?*

**Dr. B M Rajaprakash:** All I would is one word, "EXCELLENT!". Today, I am renowned in the society because of the fact that I'm a faculty member of UVCE. To describe the recognition and respect that one garner's as a faculty member or as a student or as part of such a historical institution is tremendous. To be associated with UVCE, I feel honoured. UVCE, has been and will always be a second home to me.



**Team Samapada:** *Your thoughts about centenary celebrations and current situation of UVCE and improvements needed.*

**Dr.BMR:** What needed most with the current situation of UVCE is a comprehensive development plan and it must be approved in appropriate bodies. It should include development proposals for improving the infrastructure, upgradation of lab equipment with current requirement and standards, additional faculty and technical staff to cater to students' academic needs better. Immediate attention should be drawn to fill the existing vacant faculty posts. The intake of students through CET should be increased once these developments are underway. An action plan has to be implemented to provide a good and well maintained hostel facility for the students.

Talking about the Centenary Celebrations of UVCE, a juncture in history of UVCE where I am proud that I am part of it. While sketching the plan for the UVCE centenary celebrations what must be borne most importantly is that the celebrations shouldn't just be momentary but should enhance UVCE in the long run. We must think about the future of UVCE like how it will and has to appear after 50 years rather just than just thinking about the present. Funds collected have to be maintained, there should be a proper mechanism for the collection and utilisation of these funds. People donate the funds but they hesitate because they are not sure about how effectively their funds are being used.

UVCE is a 100 year old college now, and for its celebrations, 100 crores can be sanctioned through the MHRD scheme if an appropriate proposal is made. This has to be implemented effectually. This ought to be done 5 years back itself but it's always better now than never. Also, Government should be made accountable. The condition is that people who have power have no concern, people who have concern have no power and people who have both don't make up their minds. All the developments to be proposed should be discussed with parents, staff, students, public and politicians. Those who have power should set aside everything and think about UVCE.

**Team Samapada:** *How should faculty and the alumni collaborate?*

**Dr.BMR:** The collaboration of students, faculty and alumni is an essential at any point of time for an institution. Alumni should actively involve with the college with sense of giving back something to their alma mater. They can mentor students, grant monetary funds, moral support, entrepreneurship, provide internship and jobs. They should not have the notion that they have to be invited. They should voluntarily come to the college. They can reach out to the students through the college website, emails and notice boards. They can interact with the faculty at any time for any plans they may have for college.

## TREK @ JB CAMPUS, BANGALORE UNIVERSITY

JNANABARATHI TREKKING was organized on 17th September 2016, around 120 students from various departments with 75 of the students from CIVIL Engineering, 10 from Architecture and 25 from Law department actively took part in the event.

First we visited "Charaka Vana", a beautiful garden of medicated plants with around 550 varieties of species from various parts of the country. Fortunately we could have the great environmentalist Dr.A.N.Yellappa Reddy who very enthusiastically explained us about the importance and uses of the medicinal plants, he also made an appeal in the young minds to protect and conserve the rich biodiversity and ecosystem of the University which is a very unique one in the country.

ECO-THERAPY is a day long wonderful program for mentally challenged special children conducted on every third Saturday at Charaka Vana. We were very lucky to participate in it, all of us could interact with them which was really an awesome experience that doesn't just fit in words.

Then we moved on towards the Geological rock complex which had different geomorphological forms which is very rare to be found at a single point. Dr. K. V. Krishnamurthy, Retd. DDG GSI and Dr.T.J.Renuka prasad, Professors from GEOLOGY department, explained us about the mechanism of its formation and the significance of its study in CIVIL engineering. Students were very amazed to know that these rocks was a 3.2 billion years old and oldest in India which is a Geological Monument that has to be conserved forever.

Moving on we saw Contour bunding made on the slope area which act as an artificial ground water recharge and also prevents soil erosion. We also visited another Geological rock complex where we could see and appreciate many beautiful forms formed over billions of years. Students were very happy to get the practical experience of the knowledge acquired in the theory classes. All of us got refreshed by having some water at NSS Bhavan, thanks to their Hospitality.





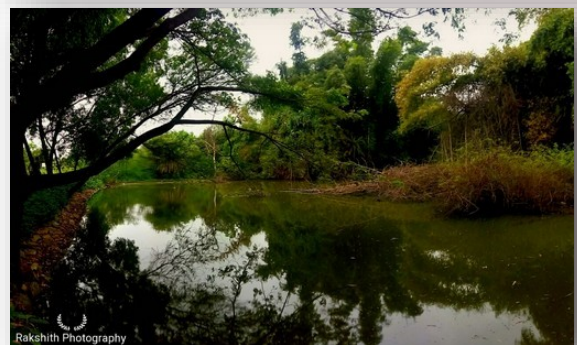
Heading towards the check dams in the forest, on the way Mr.Ramachandrappa-A walking encyclopaedia of plants who explained us about various Flora and Fauna in the campus. We could visit two check dams of five which harnessed rain water and prevented it from getting polluted by joining Vrushabavathi valley. We were very pleased to acknowledge the very significant contribution of our Faculty of CIVIL Engineering in planning and construction of these dams. Dr.Prasad made us aware of the vital role of check dams and Contour bunds in recharging ground water levels. He was very happy to say that it has pushed the water table upwards by more than a meter high which has recharged all the dried up Bore wells and helped in thick afforestation of the barren land.

We could appreciate many features of the dam such as catchment area, bunding, stone pitching, barrier, water level marking scale and many different things which we had studied in the units of Hydrology.

We initially started the trek intending to wind up at 11.30 am but it was 2.30 pm by the time we realized that the enthralling journey came to an end.

We learnt new things, discovered the unseen, breathed the fresh air, met many amazing people, made new friends and many more...

But, off late, there is an impression even from the students that they are not bothered about the institution or the education it is providing them. Everyone is worried about getting 70% aggregate marks, a Degree Certificate and an Offer from a MNC. Most of the Saturdays there are no classes to the students. Isn't it a wrong precedent? What is the message to the student who has to be in the college 6 days a week, atleast 8 hours a day? When we claim that we have lot of free time in college, are we also measuring how is it being utilized?

As mentioned earlier, we are not just stating problems, but also the various attempts made from our VisionUVCE Team to provide a platform to students and alumni to mutually benefit. "VINIMAYA" - a book exchange initiative started by students; "G2C2" - a college cleaning student group - we supported all these initiatives with all our resources. "Project VISHISHT" - an opportunity for students to submit technical projects and will be funded/guided by us did not get the response as expected. "UVCE Mentorship" - a great idea to build interaction among the alumni/students did take-off but was not continued. For all these initiatives, we will need support from both alumni and students.
